## Affidavit

I, Dr.Ing. Franz LASZLE, residing at 186 Park Street, West Brunswick, Melbourne, N.12, Victoria, Australia, being aware of the significance of the oath and having warned that I shall render myself liable to punishment by making a false affidavot, declare the following to relation to the MRUPP case and on behalf of the derendant Professor Dr. Ing. Edouard HOUDREMONT, my statement may be used as evidence in Court, in particular before the American Military Tribunal in Nurnberg.

As my wife as well as I myself and, therefore, also my two children are fullblooded Jews, I endeavored since 1937 to get out of Germany. At that time I was the head of the laboratory No.I for the testing of materials of the Siemens-Schuckert-Works, Ltd., in Berlin-Siemensstadt. After some other fruitless attempts I also asked Professor HOUDREMONT (itmay have been in the spring of 1938) whetherhe could and would take steps in helping me to get a job outside of Germany. He said he would do his best. Although Herr Professor HOUDREMONT showed the utmost reluctance with respect to such a measures and declared it completely superfluous, I subsequently approach ed thenthen Director General of the Siemens-Schuckert-Works, Herr Dr. KOETTGEN and asked him to request Dr. HOUDREHONT on his part too so that Herr Professor Dr. HOUDREMONT would have some backing. Herr Dr. KOETTGEN then invited Herr Professor HOUDREMONT to Siemensstadt, and Herr Prefessor HOUDREMONT afterwards gave me a valuable tip by indicating that Herr Dr. KOETTGENobviously had displayed the greatest interest for Dr. HOUDBEMONT recommending a suitable successor for me in Siemensstadt.

At the end of 1928, the German Society for Metallurgy had

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its main meeting in Munich, on which occasion Dr.C.H,DESCH, F.R.S; from London ( the then Superintendent of the Mining Department of the English National Physical Laboratory) was to give a lecture as a guest

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sent me to the Society for the Protection of Science and Bearing in order to submit there an application for a position at the University of Melbourner (Australia), where I am working at present. The secretary of that society asked me for German references.

Among six names I also gave that of Herr Professor HOUDREMONT, but told the secretary that it would be possible that none of the six gentlemen would dare to reply to the inquiry. Some days later the secretary told me that my apprehensions had been unwarranted because Herr Professor HOUDREMONT had sent his answer by return mail. This service of Herr Professor HOUDREMONT proved to be of the utmost importance to me.

For the purpose of strain hardoning of armature caps from nonmagnetic steel for the rotating field magnets of turbo-generators, the
firm of KRUPP has developed an excellent process on the basis of an
idea of mine, and gave me also a remuneration for this idea approximately in 1932. In the spring of 1938, when I discussed with Professor HOUDHEMONT my imminent emigration he authorized me to axploit
this process abroad to my exclusive benefit after my emigration. (Actually I offered this process to an English firm in January 1939, although
without results - and I have done nothing about it since then). It
was quite unusual that Herr Professor HOUDHEMONT was willing to help
me economically in this manner. To be sure, we have been acquainted
since 1922 or 1923 and have always maintained the best possible professimual friendship. I have hardly ever met another German professional
colleague who, in my opinion, had a better and more stable character.
